Autism Spectrum Disorder is a developmental disability that occurs in children during the first 5 years and tends to persist into adulthood. It affects the social and communication skills and behavioural development of the child. Early identification of autism is important so that special care and attention can be given to affected children as early as possible. Studies estimate that 1 in 160 children are affected by autism disorder and the prevalence of this disorder seems to be increasing.

The cause of autism disorders is attributed to many factors including genetic and environmental factors. Once a child with autism is identified, the family and caretaker of the child should be given proper consultation, services, referrals, and practical support, according to the individual needs. At present, there is no cure for autism but psychological interventions such as behavioural treatment and skills training programs can reduce difficulties in communication and social interaction. The needs of people with autism are quite complex and require a range of integrated services. It includes healthcare, rehabilitation services, education, employment, and social care.

A person with autism is often negatively affected in terms of education, employment, and social attainments. The disability of autism differs from person to person. The person with autism and his/her family are mostly under stress due to emotional and economic burdens.
